The Power of Prayer

Abraham sends one of his servants to his people to find a bride for his son, Isaac. Arriving at the city of Nahor, the servant stops by a well outside the city and prays. "Before [Abraham's servant] had done speaking [i.e. praying], behold, Rebecca, who was born to Bethuel the son of Milcah, the wife of Nahor, Abraham's brother, came out with her water jar upon her shoulder" (Genesis 24:15). This verse provides Luther with an occasion to teach us important lessons about prayer:

"From this passage one can get the explanation of the previous question in the servant's prayer, which included nearly all circumstances and prescribed to God. This conflicts with the doctrine of Christians and with the Word of God, which teaches that the time, place, and manner of doing something must be left to God, and that only the thing itself should be asked for, with the confidence that He will give it in His own time and place.

"But if help is delayed, one should not for this reason stop praying. Nevertheless, a time or something similar can be suggested, with a condition: "Lord God, if at this time or at this place it could be done as I would want it, I pray Thee not to fail me now," just as we are now praying for Philip [Melanchthon - Luther's colleague], who is away from us and lies seriously ill at Weimar, that God would restore to him his strength and health and preserve him longer for the church and the university.

"Furthermore, it is believable that the servant prayed in this manner not only at this hour, when he was standing at the spring, but during the entire journey; and when he had been commanded to journey to this region and Abraham had assured him that an angel would be his companion, it was necessary for him to specify the place and the time in accordance with the command and promise of his master. Nevertheless, because Abraham had released him from the obligation of the oath if he did not find a suitable wife for his son, he no doubt committed the entire affair to God's care. If God did not want to give her from this land, city, or house, He would give a much more suitable wife from another place or in another manner.

"In addition, this passage presents a clear example of God's mercy and kindness in hearing the prayers of the godly. By means of this example we are invited to pray, and our faith is marvelously strengthened against mistrust and doubt. For these events have been recorded, not for the sake of the servant but for your sake and mine. Before he had stopped speaking, behold, his prayer was heard; while he was speaking, God said yes to his prayer.

"Therefore let us persuade ourselves without any hesitation that God is ever so ready and prompt to hear our prayer and to grant what we ask for, as Ps. 66:20 praises Him: "Blessed be God, because He has not rejected my prayer or removed His steadfast love from me!" And the name of God that is suitable to the highest degree and proper is Hearer of Prayer. Indeed, it is just as proper as the familiar name Creator of Heaven and Earth.

"And God not only hears a prayer that is offered without specifying particulars; but let us maintain that even at the very moment a prayer is uttered that which is asked for is being done or has been done, just as very many ever so pleasing words of the psalms testify, such as "To Thee they cried, and were saved" (Ps. 22:5), where simply no particular at all is added.

"Consequently, the one who cries out is here; God, who hears is there. Just cry out, and you will be heard, as Ps. 34:5 urges: "Look to Him, and be radiant; so your faces shall never be ashamed." And from this source Isaiah has taken the very beautiful promise (65:24): "Before they call, I will answer; while they are yet speaking, I will hear." Thus in one place Bernard has stated excellently and piously: "Brethren, do not despise your prayers; but know that as soon as you begin to pray, your prayer is read and written down at once in the presence of the Divine Majesty."

"Of this way of praying all the monks have no knowledge, for they merely mumble their prayers on account of obedience to the church or to their own rule. Accordingly, you should pray with such trust and full assurance that you maintain that your prayer has been heard before it leaves your mouth. But if what you are asking for is not granted so quickly, your prayer will not on this account be in vain. It will be granted in His time, and what you wish will be granted, or something far better and more desirable.

"Therefore let there be no doubt whatever about being heard. Indeed, when I ask God to hallow His name against the pope and against the Turk, I know that my prayer has certainly been heard before I add the amen; for before I have begun to pray, God has seen the motion and the desire of my heart, and this He sees and hears far sooner than my lips utter the words.

"But hindrances of many kinds are put in the way, for the devil resists and disturbs this

confidence in whatever way he can. Our flesh and hearts do not burn with faith; nor are they stirred by constantly meditating on and dealing with the statements and examples of this kind that should be reflected on by the heart and often repeated for the purpose of stirring us up to prayer against the pope and all potentates who persecute sound doctrine. But if the desired effect or result does not follow this year, it will surely follow in another year.

"But among all the examples of prayers the one described in Dan. 9:20–21 is outstanding and a jewel, so to speak. I earnestly commend it to all godly people. Daniel says: "While I was still speaking and praying, etc., behold, the man Gabriel, etc." All this is described, not in order that we should read it only once in passing, the way we are accustomed to become acquainted with secular examples, but that we may be instructed, and in such a manner that we maintain that it pertains to us. Nor should we have any doubt about being heard; but we should leave the place, the time, and all particulars to the will and counsel of God.

"Whoever does this will experience through the actual result how wonderful the power and efficacy of prayer is. For "likewise the Spirit also helps us in our weakness ... and intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words" (Rom. 8:26). And Eph. 3:20 states: "Who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think." We ask solely for these outward blessings: peace, quiet, good health, and the things necessary for this life. But God's power surpasses all our understanding, hope, and asking. Consequently, God bestows on those who call upon Him more and greater things than the human heart can comprehend or request; for we worship Him whose power and beneficence are boundless. Indeed, He also determines all the particulars, the place, the time, and

the person far better and more successfully than we would prescribe with our thinking. Therefore let us habituate and stir up our hearts to prayer, in order that many may pray together; for the greater the number of those who will pray, the more quickly and more abundantly they will get what they ask for. But one must pray in the name of Christ, not of Mary, Peter, or other saints, as the papists are in the habit of doing. But of this we have often spoken elsewhere.

"Up to this point Moses [as author of Genesis] has described the faith and prayer of the servant; for faith must precede in all our works and activities, even in the smallest. Whether we eat, sleep, or engage in domestic or civic services, everything should proceed from faith, prayer, and thanksgiving, since the works of the godly should be good and pleasing to God. This cannot be the case unless fervent faith and prayer to do and direct everything are present. Paul suggests the same thing in Col. 3:17: "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (LW 4:266-269).

They are delighted to be a part of St. Luke's Lutheran family!






VBS with **VBQ** in July
