Mission San Antonio San Antonio de Padua

San Antonio de Padua is the third mission and was founded by Father Serra on July 14, 1771 in Valle de los Robles. The mission is named for Saint Anthony. In 1773, the mission was moved to a site further north. The adobe church was completed in 1782 and the present building began in 1810 and completed in 1813. It was abandoned between 1882 and 1928. It was selected, in 1903, by the California Historic Landmarks League as one of their first restoration projects. In 1948, further restoration began when the mission received a grant for restoration. San Antonio de Padua is now an accurate replica of the original mission as it stood in 1813. It has an extensive *museum* with a number of exhibits displaying various aspects of daily life at the mission.

Mission San Luis Obispo San Luis Obispo de Tolosa

This mission, situated in San Luis Obispo, was founded in September 1, 1772, by Father Serra and is named for Saint Luis, Bishop of Toulouse. It is located near the Valley of Bears which got its name from the many bears that inhabited the area. The Spanish hunted the bears and shared the meat with nearby missions as well as with the Native Americans who later showed their appreciation when Father Serra founded the mission. The present building was built between 1793 and 1794 and was restored in 1933. The former *convento* (which now contains a *museum* and gift shop) has a distinctive front colonnade of eleven round columns.

Mission San Luis Rey San Luis Rey de Francia

San Luis Rey de Francia nicknamed “King of the Missions” became the eighteenth of the missions and the largest and most populous of all. It was founded by Father Lasuén June 13, 1798, the ninth and last mission founded before his death in 1803. Named for Louis IX, King of France (1215-1270), the present church was designed by Father Antonio Peyri. Building began in 1811 and was completed and dedicated in 1815. Mission San Luis Rey also had the largest herd of livestock of any of the missions. In addition to the greater than 50,000 cattle and sheep, they had 1,300 goats, 300 pigs, and almost 2,000 horses. The Franciscans left the mission in 1846 but returned in 1892 and began the restoration. Look for the original hand hammered baptismal font in the baptistery, along with religious iconography and mission era art and artifacts exhibited in a beautiful interpretive *museum*.

Mission Sonoma San Francisco Solano

San Francisco Solano was the last and northernmost mission in California’s chain of missions and is named for St. Francis Solano, missionary to the Peruvian Indians. It was founded without the prior approval of the Church by Father José Altimira, July 4, 1823, in Sonoma. The government allowed Father Altimira to continue with his establishments because they thought it would stop the Russians advancing from the north. It was also the only mission founded after Mexico’s independence from Spain. Building began in 1823. The church was attacked by Native Americans in 1826 after Altimira’s constant beatings and imprisonment. Altimira fled to Mission San Rafael and eventually returned to Spain. The present chapel was built in 1840 by General Vallejo. The Historic Landmarks League purchased the mission property in 1903, and with state funds, restored the mission.

When complete, in 1926, it was turned over to the state. It is now the Sonoma Mission State Historic Park.. The wing that was the padre’s quarters is now a *museum*. What was the dining room in this section of the mission now displays mission paintings done by Chris Jorgensen between 1903-1905. The Mexican-era soldier’s barracks (just across from the mission) have been restored and now contain a small *museum* and a gift shop.

St. Luke’s Lutheran Church La Mesa

St. Luke’s Lutheran Church was founded in 1945. Its main sanctuary was finished in 1957. It in coming decades with a school and family center. In 2007, St. Luke’s declared a “new beginning.” Now, will St. Luke’s be a *mission* or a museum? Correspondingly, will it thus need a curate of souls or a curator?

Congregational Forum - 13 June

At its last meeting, the church council set Sunday, 13 June 2010, as a day for our next congregational forum.

Having successfully left the ELCA, the church council would like St.

Luke’s to turn its attention toward St. Luke’s future and the church’s future mission needs. The topic for this forum is the development of a comprehensive plan for renovations of unused or underutilized space in the lower level and in the old chapel.

Over the past few years, a process overseen by the church council has moved from the idea of redecorating the lower level to considering renovations looking into the next 50 years. When Bob Des Lauriers declined anything but an advisory role in these discussions, expert advice was sought from a local architect.

That architect, Mr. Michael Matalon, listened to St. Luke's current and future needs. From those descriptions, he drafted some preliminary sketches of various possibilities. The most practical and suitable sketches have been on display in the lower level for some weeks now.

These sketches have generated discussion in the congregation. Most of that discussion has been very positive. Many people are excited about this aspect of our "new beginning." We look forward to your attendance at the forum.

Church warned that flag of Jesus is 'religious advertising'

Rev Mark Binney, vicar of St Andrew's Church, Hampton, Worcs, [England] said he had been told he needed planning permission if he wanted to fly a flag "advertising Christianity" in future.

The flag was put up outside the church in the week preceding Easter Sunday displaying the words 'This is Holy Week' and an image of Jesus on the cross.

Mr Binney said the warning was "appalling", and he felt it was part of a gradual erosion of Christianity in Britain.

Wychavon [town] council said it investigated a complaint from a member of the public and decided no consent was required.

A spokesman said flags other than national flags, county flags, or flags for patron saints, required advertisement consent if they were flown from a vertical freestanding flagpole.

He said the council would consider allowing the flag to be flown for a week in future if it was approached by the church.

MOTHERS 'N OTHERS RECIPES

MARTHA STEWART'S LEMON COOKIES

Makes 24

2 cups all-purpose flour (spooned and leveled)
 ½ teaspoon baking soda
 ½ teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoons finely grated lemon zest, plus 2
 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
 ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, room temperature
 (I had no unsalted butter, so used regular salted)
 1 cup granulated sugar
 1 large egg
 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, salt and lemon zest. In a large bowl, using an electric mixer, beat butter and granulated sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg, vanilla, and lemon juice and beat until combined. With mixer on low, beat in flour mixture.

2. Drop dough by heaping tablespoons, 1 inch apart, onto two baking sheets. Bake until edges are golden, 15 to 20 minutes, rotating sheets halfway through. Let cool 2 minutes on sheets, then transfer cookies to a wire rack to cool completely. Spread cookies with Lemon Glaze and let set, about 1 hour.

LEMON GLAZE

2 cups confectioners' sugar

2 tablespoons finely grated lemon zest
 ½ cup fresh lemon juice

1. In a medium bowl, whisk together 2 cups confectioners' sugar, 2 tablespoons finely grated lemon zest, and 1/3 cup fresh lemon juice until smooth.

MAY THOMASES ENGLISH MUFFINS

Toast English muffins
 Spread with the following:

1 4 and ½ oz can chopped black olives
 1 small onion minced (I use less)
 1 cup good quality cheddar cheese shredded
 (packaged, shredded cheese does not taste as
 good)
 ½ cup mayonnaise
 ½ teaspoon curry powder (scant)

Place on cookie sheet and bake at 500 degrees for 5 minutes. Watch closely as they burn easily at this temp.

ST. LUKE'S CHICKEN (Serves 4)

Mix together:
 ½ cup prepared ranch dressing (Costco)
 2 tablespoons Cabo San Lucas Carne Asada Spice Rub from the "Tomorrow Project" (1777 5th Avenue, S.D. 619-230-1151). Purchased at the Alternative Gift Fair.

3 chicken breasts thawed, rinsed well and patted dry. Slice in strips. Place strips in marinade overnight or bake immediately. To bake, place in Pyrex dish.

Broil just long enough for chicken to brown a little on top. Turn down oven to 325 degrees. Bake for about 20 minutes more. Test for doneness based on your oven. Do not overcook.
