Robert Frost in his famous poem "The Road Not Taken" speaks of two paths in life. This short poem reads:

Imagine walking into a room with 50 to 100 people and no one says anything to you. You look at the pictures on the wall or look at pamphlets in a rack and try not to listen to the various conversations going on around you. People avoid eye contact and no one says "hello". If you found yourself in this situation you might say "why did I come here". This is how visitors to our church could feel! If you see someone you don't know, do you make an effort to say "hello"? ### **HEIFER INTERNATIONAL.....**

#### **ENDING WORLD HUNGER; SAVING THE EARTH**

Poland is welcoming back Suwalska geese, Green Leg hens, Polish Red cattle and other local breeds as farmers struggle to adapt to modern times and the challenges that come with membership in the European Union. Political and economic upheavals sapped much of Polish agriculture's traditional independence as farmers abandoned locally developed breeds of animals in favor of modern varieties.

Poland is one of the most agricultural countries in Europe. While many are still struggling to adapt to changes in the country, they are a very resilient and adaptable people. With HEIFER INTERNATIONAL's help, farmers have received training and livestock to return to their agricultural roots and develop hardy local breeds of animals.

For example, Polish Red cattle have been husbanded since the Middle Ages, and once constituted 25 percent of the national herd. As recently as a decade ago, though, there were only 150 left in the country. With their compact bodies and stout legs, Polish Reds are well adapted to the climate and rocky, uneven terrain. Because they're smaller than improved breeds, their feed requirements are much lower. They are prolific producers of milk that is higher in fat, protein and enzymes....perfect for cheese making. They are long-lived, dual-purpose (can be raised for both beef and milk), highly fertile, good natured, robust and resistant to disease. Also highly independent, Polish Red cows often birth their calves without assistance, unlike Holsteins, which require more vigilance on the part of their owners.

HEIFER began operating in Poland 16 years ago, first as the program office for Central and Eastern Europe beginning in 1992, and later as an office exclusively serving Poland in Warsaw since 1998. With a staff of eight, the office has initiated 70 projects, benefiting 10,000 farm families in every part of the country.

Redevelopment of heritage and native breeds of animals is a main facet of these projects.

Nine of the dozen breeds of animals that Heifer Poland distributes to farm families are indigenous to the country.

With YOUR help, HEIFER is placing local breeds of cows, geese, chickens, pigs and horses which are superior to those of their more commercial counterparts, with even more families like those in Poland.

At a recent Deborah Circle, Bev Holland and Betty Davies served some very yummy treats. They were so good that all agreed the recipes should appear in the Builder. So here are the featured WELCA RECIPES for July.

### Jeweled Fruit Salad

#### Dressing

1 cup (8 ounces) vanilla yogurt  
2 tablespoons orange juice  
1 tablespoon mayonnaise  
½ teaspoon grated orange peel

Serve over fruit of your choice, but Betty served green grapes cut in half, 1 can (11 ounces) mandarin oranges, drained, 1 cup fresh or frozen blueberries, 1 cup fresh or frozen raspberries, 1 medium kiwifruit, peeled and chopped, ¼ cup fresh or frozen cranberries, thawed and halved.

### Easy Cake Dessert

1 stick butter or margarine  
1 can (8 ounces) crushed pineapple, packed in juice  
½ to 1 cup sweetened flaked coconut, optional (Betty left this out.)  
6 to 8 very ripe bananas (you can use frozen bananas, but don't thaw them, just cut with sharp knife)  
1/3 to ½ cup orange marmalade, optional  
1 box (18.25 ounces) white or yellow cake mix  
½ to 1 cup pecan pieces (Any kind of nuts can be used)

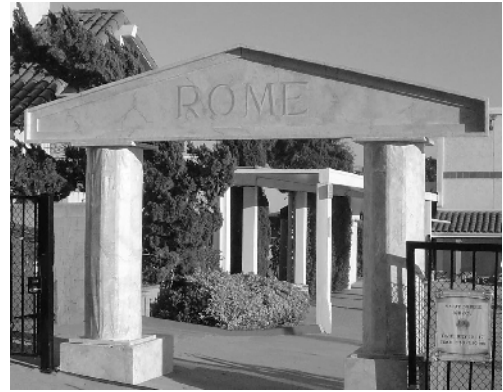
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut the butter into 4 pieces and place in a microwave-safe dish. Microwave on high covered with a paper towel, until the butter just melts, about 1 minute. Set aside.

Grease a 13 by 9 in glass or metal baking dish with butter. Spread the pineapple (with its juice) evenly in the bottom of the prepared dish. If using coconut, sprinkle it over the pineapple. Cut the bananas into slices about ¼ inch thick and place them evenly over the dish.

If using marmalade, microwave it for 30 seconds on high to make it easier to spread. Spoon the marmalade evenly over the fruit.

Sprinkle the cake mix evenly over the fruit. Drizzle the melted butter and pecans evenly over the cake mix.

Bake 45 to 50 minutes or until the cake is golden and bubbly. Enjoy, enjoy. Serves 12
