### Easter is about what?

Ecumenical News International (ENI) issued the following excerpt on 17 March,

"While most Americans describe Easter as a religious holiday, less than half of U.S. adults surveyed link it specifically to the Resurrection of Jesus, a Barna Group study shows. Seven in 10 respondents mentioned religion or spirituality in their response to an open-ended question about how they describe what Easter means to them personally. But just 42 percent tied Easter to the Resurrection following the death of Jesus on the cross."

So, there we have it. Less than half of the US population surveyed is not sure what the central event of Christianity is. This ENI excerpt does not offer any form of analysis regarding which denominations might have fared "better" and which not. Compared to the hot topic of sex, which infatuates so many US denominations, the resurrection of the dead is probably passé at best and a bit macabre at worst. Let us put this in a different light. If less than half of the US population surveyed did not know that McDonald's makes hamburgers, then someone would be falling down on the job and should probably be grilled, so to speak, regarding poor performance.

As we are aware, many churches today spend much of their time and resources trying to make themselves "relevant" that they may be overlooking the resurrection. The resurrection does not fit well into potential parishioners' "perceived needs." It does not come with "warm fuzzies." It does not dazzle the eye or deafen the ear. Instead, it is perceived, received, and believed through simple, human, verbal communication.

The good news (gospel) of the crucified Christ being raised from the dead, if not good, is apparently still news to a significant portion of the population. So, what are we at St. Luke's doing about this situation?

St. Luke's is looking for ways to raise its profile in the community. Perhaps, a central part of that should be communicating - explicitly whom God has raised from the dead. We know that there are so many aspects of Christianity which we find interesting and sometimes entertaining. There are so many projects which we find fulfilling. There are so many activities which we desire to accomplish in order to keep the parish active. Perhaps, we need to reflect and then communicate programmatically the resurrection of Jesus Christ as that aspect of the Christian faith which God found so interesting, fulfilling, and desirable to accomplish in his son, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

### Women of St. Luke's

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF APPEAL Thanks to all of you who responded to our appeal for Health Kit items. April and May are the months when we gather supplies for Sewing Kits. Thousands of sewing kits are distributed each year around the world. They are often used in vocational training programs to teach young men and women sewing skills that they can use to earn an income. There are boxes in the narthex and the Lower Level to receive any items from the following list:

- 1. Cotton or cotton-blend fabric (no knits or 100% polyester); fabric should have no stains or holes and be cut into a piece measuring:
  - 2 ¼ yards of 60" wide fabric, or
  - 3 yards of 44" wide fabric, or
  - 4 yards of 36" wide fabric
- 2. One package of about 10-15 needles for hand sewing. (needles purchased in larger packages can be divided by inserting 12 needles into a swatch of felt or thick fabric.)
- 3. One spool of matching general purpose thread, 250-300 yards.
- 4. Six to 10 average size matching buttons ( $\frac{1}{2}$ " to  $\frac{3}{4}$ " preferred). Attach buttons to a card or string together with yarn or heavy cord.

Remember all items must be new and should not contain any patriotic or religious symbols.

You do not need to donate a complete kit. If you see a good bargain on fabric, thread or needles, drop it in your shopping cart. The Women of St. Luke's Project Day ladies will organize the kits and send them off to Lutheran World Relief.

### ON GOING OUTREACH

Marge Hersom, a member of the Outreach Committee, recently attended a Saturday morning workshop at First Lutheran downtown. This workshop was all about TACO. Information shared: when did the program begin, how many people are served, who runs the programs, how they are paid for, how many people volunteer, when are the clinics, and how First Lutheran's congregation supports this ministry. If you would like to know more about any of these frequently asked questions, ask Marge.

Here are some facts about TACO that may be new to you based on services provided during 2008 and 2009:

- ... Provided for the medical care of over 1,100 people who would not have had access to such care (this includes those who have diabetes, hypertension, heart disease and high cholesterol)
- ... Provided for the dental needs of 300-400 individuals
- ... Met with more than 300 people to assist in obtaining documents for health care, insurance, and housing
- ... Helped 25 people return home to other cities and states to resolve their homelessness
- ... Met with city officials to represent the needs of those who are poorest and most without in our community.

All of this work relies on the dedication of many volunteers and partner organizations. TACO employs just one full-time director and four part-time staff including the volunteer coordinator, Simon's Walk coordinator, and two program/administrative staff at eight hours each.

The schedule for contributing toward TACO's ongoing needs for the homeless will be as follows:

MAY: Men's socks and disposable razors JUNE: Personal hygiene items such as hotel-size shampoos, small bars of soap, chapstick, toothbrushes and small toothpastes, dental floss, small washcloths, etc.

JULY: Non-perishable, no refrigeration items for sack lunches such as water bottles, fruit cups and spoons, small cans of tuna, crackers, packages of cookies, granola or energy bars, etc.

### Maureen Borchardt's Apple Cake
