"To build or not to build. That is not the question." As many are aware, discussions have begun regarding the possibility of renovating some of our building spaces. The current configuration of rooms in the Lower Level and in the old chapel inhibit their effective use for St. Luke's current needs. So, what does one do with unused and underutilized space? There are a limited number of choices. One can do nothing. One can work around such space. One can redevelop the space. So, which is it to be?

What do Scripture and the Lutheran confessions say about church buildings?

In Mark 13:2, Jesus said, "Do you see these great buildings? There will not be left here one stone upon another, that will not be thrown down."

In 2:19-21, "Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and I will raise it again in three days.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this temple, and you are going to raise it in three days?' But the temple he had spoken of was his body."

I Corinthians 3:19-20 states, "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God? You are not your own; you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body."

Likewise, I Peter 2:4-5 says, "Come to him, to that living stone, rejected by men but in God's sight chosen and precious; and like living stones be yourselves built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ."

Article 7 of the *Augsburg Confession* states,

“It is also taught that at all time there must be and remain one holy, Christian church. It is the assembly of all believers among whom the gospel is purely preached and the holy sacraments are administered according to the gospel. For this is enough for the true unity of the Christian church that there the gospel is preached harmoniously according to a pure understanding and the sacraments are administered in conformity with the divine Word.”

As both Scripture and the Lutheran confessions show, Jesus radically altered and “altared” our understanding of church (temple). The church is not made of dead, inanimate building materials. Instead, it is the living construct created by the living gospel of the resurrected and now eternally living Jesus Christ. With the aid of a little bread, a little wine, a little water, and at least two or three gathered together, God makes the church alive solely through the pure proclamation of the gospel that God forgives us sinners by faith alone in Christ alone.

So, what does that have to do with walls and paint and windows and toilets and plumbing and flooring and roofing and the like? Absolutely nothing, of course. Unfortunately, we sinful human beings get very animated and often very agitated about surrounding ourselves with dead, inanimate objects which we mistakenly hold to be a church. In fact, these dead building materials often created much more discord and destruction among Christians than their cost warrants.

In relation to our “new beginning,” we at St. Luke’s are called not to build but first and foremost to be built into a living temple which incorporates not only current but future members.

The chief architect in this endeavour is always God the Father, and his chief draftsman is always Jesus Christ, and their chief project manager is always the life-giving love of the Holy Spirit. So, whatever renovations we may or may not undertake on our building structures, they are and must only ever be a reflection of the living temple which God fashions us to be for his mission and service.

We are ever so grateful for all the planning and efforts so carefully poured into our Easter celebrations. The decision to have two Easter services proved to be the impetus for greater than anticipated delights. We wish to thank the choir, the musicians, and Sue Caldwell for their outstanding contributions to both services. We wish to thank Parish Education for serving such a wonderful brunch between the services. We thank Jennifer Killion and all who helped her decorate the cross so beautifully. We wish to thank all the ushers, communion assistants, acolytes, sound tech, and altar guild members for making both services run so smoothly. Most importantly, we thank God for the baptism of Brynn Elizabeth Skullerud at the second service who brought a living reflection of Christ’s cross and resurrection into our midst. We all have been made alive through the power of the promise of the resurrection. Let us share this word as a gift of eternal life.

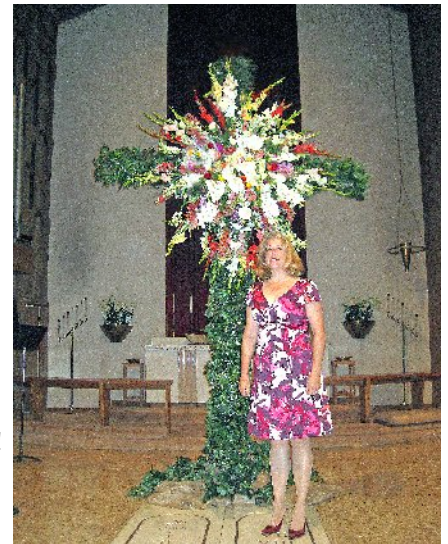


PARISH POTPOURRI

Below find the recipe for Company Strata from the St. Luke's Cookbook, 50 Years At the Lord's Table.

COMPANY STRATA

12 slices white bread (frozen)
 14 oz. cheddar cheese, grated
 1 10oz pkg frozen broccoli, cooked, drained and chopped (or fresh cooked)
 2 cup diced ham
 6 slightly beaten eggs
 3 ½ cups milk
 2 T. instant minced onion
 ½ tsp. garlic powder
 1 tsp. dried mustard

Remove crusts from bread. Cut frozen slices with donut cutter to make 12 rings and 12 holes. Fit scraps of bread into bottom of lightly oiled 13x9x2 inch baking dish. Top with ¾ of the grated cheese, ham cubes and chopped broccoli. Arrange bread rings on top and fill in with holes. Combine eggs, mild and seasonings; pour over bread. Refrigerate covered for at least 6 hours. (Great recipe to prepare day before.) Bake, uncovered at 325 degrees for 45 minutes. Sprinkle remaining cheese. Bake 10 minutes more. Cool 10 minutes before cutting into squares. Serves 12.

This book takes readers much closer to understanding the lives of farmers by learning from the farmers themselves. In his conversations with more than 40 farm families in the Midwest, he says that he has not "yet visited long with any farmer he did not come to like a great deal." Holthaus says "Our human lives are all related, not only to those fundamental elements of nature.....but to all other humans. Harmony and discord.....this is essentially the story of modern agriculture - harmony and discord between people and the earth, harmony and discord between private interests and collective interests. This book is a story not of abstract characters, but of real faces.

SLLC LIBRARY NEWS

The SLLC Library has a variety of new and old books to share. Come by and browse. You will be surprised at the variety of books available. A newly acquired book (thanks to Chuck Volker) is ***The Prodigal God*** by Timothy Keller (226.806 Kel). This is one of many books by Reverend Keller. The Prodigal God is based on a sermon first preached by Dr. Edmund Clowney and taken from the well-known parable given by Jesus (Luke 15:1-3, 11-32). We know the parable and usually focus on the younger son and his relationship with his father, but Keller has focused his "sermon" on the older son. We learn that this is the reason the Pharisees left Jesus after hearing his parable. They realized they are examples of the older son, taking God's love for granted and even resenting others who may receive His love, seemingly unworthy.

“There are two ways to be your own Savior and Lord,” says Keller. “One is by breaking all the moral laws and setting your own course, and one is by keeping all the moral laws and being very, very good.” Hopefully, this has pricked your curiosity and you will check out: *The Prodigal God*.

Can I Be a Christian Without Being Weird? by Kevin Johnson (J242.63 Joh) In a crowd a Christian living like Jesus expects, really stands out and that can be tough! This book addresses how we all can follow Christ without needing to be weird, strange, or odd. The author also explains in this book how to learn to talk to God. A great read for the middle school or high school student in your life. OR, you can read and then share the insights. See you in the SLLC Library! Karen Skullerud, Library Media Specialist.
