Affirmation of Baptism

In the near future, two of our younger members will emerge from a period of ecclesial torment, usually known as catechism. The word catechism refers to Christian teaching effected through a series of questions and answers. This type of learning was particularly important in a day and age when written educational materials were generally unavailable.

As many of us are aware, Luther wrote two catechisms, the *Small Catechism* and the *Large* or *German Catechism*. The *Small Catechism* was designed for use in the home. The *Large Catechism* was directed toward church leaders. Essential for the Reformation, the *Large Catechism* was written in the language of the German people rather than in Latin. Luther said that he wished always to remain a pupil of the catechism. So, faithful Lutherans, when was the last time that you reviewed the catechisms in your own language?

The "end" of catechism is often called "confirmation." What many, if not most, Lutherans today do not know is that technically Lutherans do not have confirmation. Confusingly, many Lutheran churches have retained or reintroduced the name "confirmation," but in both theology and practice, Lutherans have no place for confirmation, a rite instituted by the Roman Church. In the Roman Church and in some others, like Anglican churches, confirmation refers to someone at a more mature age being "firmed up" or "confirmed" in their baptism. In these churches, the bishop or his representative supposedly gives the "confirmand" some "extra grace."

Lutherans view the matter very differently. Lutherans believe that all the grace one requires for life and service in the church is given in baptism. Luther could even talk in baptism of one being ordained priest, bishop, and pope. That is quite a claim. Clergy types often do not like this because it makes them feel less "special."

As the catechism teaches, not water alone but water and the word of God makes baptism effective.

For Lutherans, the word of God is all-powerful. Through God's word, all things at creation came into being. In Jesus, God's word became flesh in the incarnation and dwelt among us, and through the resurrection the word of the cross defines the Christian faith. Finally, in God's word the Holy Spirit creates and sustains the church, which is the fellowship of believers gathered around the gospel purely proclaimed in word and sacrament.

Our "confirmands" are preparing not to be confirmed but to have their baptism affirmed. It will be an opportunity for them also to affirm publicly what God has done and continues to do for them in baptism. With affirmation of their baptism, they pledge to take up their duties of ordination into the priesthood of all believers in service to God. Please, pray for them and their future ministries.

THE SIMPLE TOOL THAT SAVES WOMEN'S LIVES: Each year, the Mothers and Others Luncheon chooses a none-for-profit organization to support. This year the WELCA Board, after careful consideration, has decided to donate the proceeds of the luncheon to the Solar Cooker Project. The Solar Cooker Project provides education and materials for women in the refugee camps of Chad and Darfur. Women in these camps must travel far afield to gather firewood. But to leave camp is to gamble with death. Women and children - especially girls - are "particularly vulnerable to attack and rape when they are out getting wood" says Rachel Andres, Director of the Solar Cooker Project at Jewish World Watch. A recent survey at one refugee camp showed that journeys to collect firewood outside the camps dropped by 86% after the solar cookers were made available. Each cooker costs about \$15.00. They are simple cardboard structures lined with an aluminum product.

The cookers allow women to boil water, which kills off water-borne disease-causing microbes. They also replace the wood and kerosene stoves that produce unhealthy smoke and use scarce and expensive fuels. Food prepared with a solar cooker takes longer to cook compared with an oven or fire, but it also requires less hands-on time. More time allows women to do other things-look after their children, visit friends, tend to household chores, and especially, take care of themselves. Some women say they are able to use the time saved to learn new things, such as reading, knitting, and basket-making. Log onto solarcookerproject.org to learn more about this project. HEIFER INTERNATIONAL.....

EARTH DAY 2009

Participating in Earth Day at Balboa Park was truly a terrific experience. Each year the organization and execution of this event is more complete and well done. We had shade, a couple of tables, lots of material to give out, enough volunteers, and a great deal of interest shown by those meandering among the 400 (would you believe!) booths.

The "Beyond Our Borders" display at this year's fair featured Heifer's "house" from Ecuador. This model house served several purposes:

1. The exhibit piqued people's interest in learning more about Heifer.
2. The exhibit helped educate people as to how millions of people live in developing countries.

Many of the world's poorest people are in rural areas where Heifer International works. Most people in developing countries directly harvest their food each day and depend on animals to provide draft power, milk, eggs, fleece and other essentials. Eighty per cent of the world's farmers are without access to fossil fuels, so environmentally appropriate draft animals, such as water buffalo in Thailand, can save farmers weeks of heavy labor.

Less than 2% of people in the US are engaged in farming and ranching as a full-time enterprise. But in Africa, Asia and Latin America as many as 95% of families still farm for their livelihood.

Ecuador in South America is bordered by Columbia to the north and Peru on the east and south. It's an ethnically-diverse nation with a large population of indigenous people. There are many environmental zones: one of them is the delicate high-altitude environment called the paramo. The paramo has fragile, spongy ground cover that collects water and stops soil erosion. Alpacas' soft, padded feet don't damage the delicate ground cover. Alpacas, sheep, guinea pigs and geese are some of the animals that can help people become self-reliant in Ecuador. Families in this region also grow beans, potatoes and other crops.

No one knows why the gentle alpaca disappeared from Ecuador in the colonial times - the 17th and 18th centuries. Now the alpaca is being reintroduced to the mountainous, fragile paramo.

At home in rough, mountainous areas, llamas and alpacas provide indigenous people living on the paramo valuable yarn that they use for clothing and sell for much-needed incomes. Establishing trees in this area is one of the first steps taken in creating a sustainable farm. Trees like the Leuccana and Calliandra provide animal feed, improve soil quality and provide fences and firewood.

This project, among other things, seeks to recover eroded soils, to apply agroforestry practices, to improve small-plot irrigation, to diversify crops and to improve animal management and diversification on small-scale farms. It will be implanted in eight communities in the high and mid-altitude areas of the parish of Quisapincha. It will assist 40 families from two communities, and includes the participation of two communities in communal alpaca-raising activities, four communities in communal trout farms, and six communities in plant nurseries.

(This information is probably more than you wanted to know.....but it does inform. You know that HEIFER INTERNATIONAL is working!! It's helped 9.2 million families in 128 countries! And you, too, can help.....keep those quarters coming!!)
