Whither go we?

In American English, we hardly ever use the words "whence" and "whither" any more. Instead, we say "where from" and "where to" respectively. The words that we use reflect many things about us. They reveal often the part of the state, country, or world whence we come. They might say something about our family background or our schooling or our ethnic heritage. So, what does it mean if one asks, "Whither go we?"

Sometimes in life and in the church it feels as if we are on the road to no where. Without a doubt, church often gets caught up on our society's "busyness" and thus "business." The church should be in the world. At present, however, it seems as if American mainline Protestantism has fallen prey, as happens from time to time, to becoming like the world. As of late, it seems as if such churches seek to emulate "corporate America" as a chief way of making themselves seem to be important in the world.

Clearly, the mainline churches have not adopted "capitalistic values," as one might hear. Quite often it is the opposite, at least superficially. The continual flow of social statements from national church bodies makes this clear. That said, the denominational churches in ethos and culture seem more and more like corporations rather the body of Christ, driven not primarily by money but power.

How is this reflected? Firstly, the "hierarchy" likes to tell the "congregations" that they are not "the church." Instead, they and the people therein are treated like "church outlet stores" who are supposed to peddle policies and policy statements, corporate church logos, and "brand loyalty." Ready-made "sales" and "growth" packages come down from the "head offices" to attract more customers and reach membership "targets." In the other direction, the "head offices" want the "profits" of the ministry to spend on expansion of influence (called ecumenism and social action) and on consolidation of power in the hands of a few (called "necessary oversight" or bishops). Upward mobility is a sign of clergy "success."

What we at St. Luke's want to be will help us determine whether we go, but that is only part of the picture. What God wants us to be, say, and do is the determining factor. So, do we want to be just some "church outlet store" or are we a fellowship of believers where church "happens," where the gospel is proclaimed purely and the sacraments are administered in accordance with the gospel? Do we see ourselves as a place of "profits" or as prophetic people? Are we loyal to a corporate "logo" or do we live under the sign of the cross? Do we seek to offer a word from our sponsor or are we faithful in and to the word of God? Are we recognized by our corporate mentality or are we known "by our love" as a faithful, caring community in the body of Christ?

We are always tempted to appeal and play to the world, and national church denominations are as much or more enticed by the rule of worldly powers and prestige. Jesus lived, taught, died, and was raised to a different rule, the rule of God and the kingdom of the gospel. "Corporate churches" come and go, but the word of God remains forever (Isaiah 40:8; I Peter 1:25). The choice between the two seems easy, but realizing our common vocation is not. Let us pray that we will live for the one who died for us.

Luther reminds us that he wished to remain a pupil of the catechism his entire life, and we hope that Billy and Emily Rose will likewise remain faithful to these basic teachings of the Christian faith. As they grow in faith and knowledge of the word of God, we wish them every blessing in their faithful service as adults members of the priesthood of all believers and of St. Luke's Lutheran Church.

HEIFER INTERNATIONALAND LUCY

AS THIS ISSUE OF THE BUILDER goes to press, LUCY has been identified! The grand unveiling took place Sunday morning, May 17, during the fellowship time in the Lower Level. This fiberglass life-size Holstein was “borrowed” from Windmill Farms which is located on Del Cerro Boulevard in Del Cerro. Needless to say, transporting her to and from the store brought many smiles to many faces. Our thanks to Chuck Hersom for the use of his beautiful red Ford Ranchero.

The entire Outreach Committee sincerely appreciates all those who have contributed toward buying a heifer. One pregnant heifer, costing \$500, was our goal. It appears now that we may have enough funds for HEIFER INTERNATIONAL to send TWO animals to some community or family, helping to end hunger and poverty, and care for the earth. This has been a moooooooving experience!!

WELCA HAS BEEN PUBLICIZING the need for solar cookers, and many attending the “Mothers’ and Others’” event gave funds toward them. A recent article in HEIFER INTERNATIONAL’s World Ark magazine states that the solar cookers are “geared toward reducing reliance on firewood and preserving the pristine headwaters of many of Asia’s largest rivers. They also offer a clean alternative to fire pits and traditional stoves.”

HEIFER HEADQUARTERS ARCHITECTS have won a national award: the National American Institute of Architects 2008 Award. The building is constructed of 41 percent recycled materials, and 70 percent of the building materials used are recyclable. Architects also incorporated local lumber, stone and other materials whenever possible. Rain-water captured from the roof and parking lot is used in the building’s heating and cooling system and to feed wetlands and flush toilets!!!

Mothers and Others Luncheon Recipes

Royal English Salad

2 5oz cans water chestnuts chopped (not too fine)
 4 cups cooked shredded chicken or turkey (chicken was used at the luncheon)
 ½ pound seedless grapes cut in half
 2 cups chopped celery
 1 cup toasted almonds (may be slivered, but they were not at the luncheon)

Dressing

1 ½ cups mayonnaise
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 Scant ½ teaspoon curry powder
 1 tablespoon soy sauce

Serve on butter lettuce. All ingredients except nuts may be put together the day before for the flavors to blend. Add nuts before serving. If you multiply the recipe, do not multiply the soy and curry.

Pineapple Cream Cake

1 Duncan Hines yellow cake mix.

Frosting

1 can 20oz crushed pineapple and juice
 1 large instant vanilla pudding mix
 8 oz. cool whip
 1 c finely ground walnuts

Spread on cake, refrigerate
 sprinkle toasted flaked cocoanut on top.
