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Welcome to Genuinely Lutheran Learning's Sunday School Curriculum

The following overview and introduction to this curriculum provide essential knowledge to utilize this unique learning opportunity. Please read it carefully in order to make full use of this material.



I. Goals and Objectives

1. The Genuinely Lutheran Learning Sunday School Curriculum seeks to:

- A. Provide a basic knowledge of many important Bible stories
- B. Provide a basic knowledge of elements of Martin Luther's *Small Catechism*
- C. Lay a solid foundation for entry into catechism / confirmation instruction
- D. Offer maximum learning for children with minimal preparation by teachers
- E. Offer children and teachers opportunities to tailor lessons to each congregation's needs
- F. Offer a curriculum with rich learning experiences *free of charge*

2. The Genuinely Lutheran Learning Sunday School Curriculum hopes to:

- A. Assist, equip, and encourage each child and teacher to communicate the Word of God confidently and competently to other people as a witness to God's love revealed to us in Jesus Christ, his Son and our Lord.

II. Textbook and Catechetical Materials

1. Textbook(s)

The textbook for this Sunday School Curriculum is not the curriculum itself but the Bible. With the aid of the curriculum, children and teachers are led through the given Bible stories twice. In grades/years one through three (1 - 3), both the Old Testament and the New Testament are covered. Then, in grades/years four through six (4 - 6), the same material is learned a second time but more in-depth. Again, the Bible is the textbook.

- A. School grades/years one through three (1- 3) use *The Beginner's Bible* as their primary textbook:

The Beginner's Bible - Timeless Children's Stories, a Zonderkidz publication is produced by Zondervan of Grand Rapids, Michigan, 2005. This children's Bible is readily available online or at Christian bookstores. (Note: An earlier version of *The Beginner's Bible* was published by Zonderkidz in 1989. As most of the stories in both versions are the same, with the exception of accurate page references, this earlier edition could be used for most of the GLL Sunday School Curriculum.)

- B. School grades/years four and five (4-5) use *DK The Children's Illustrated Bible*, stories by Selina Hastings, illustrated by Eric Thomas (London/New York: Dorling Kindersley, 2004 and later).
- C. School grade/year six (6) should use a regular Bible as its primary textbook for more in-depth study of the stories in the curriculum. The Bible version is to be selected by individual congregations or individual Sunday school teachers. Teachers are encouraged to continue to use *The Children's Illustrated Bible* for its easy overview of the stories and for its colorful illustrations.

The curriculum itself uses biblical material from the *Revised Standard Version* (RSV), the *New Revised Standard Version* (NRSV), and the *New International Version* (NIV), mainly for the memory verses. Other Bible versions may be used for the memory verses.

2. Catechetical Material

The catechetical material is paraphrased or translated from Martin Luther's *Small and Large Catechisms* as found in the ninth edition of the *Bekennnisschriften der evangelisch-lutherischen Kirche* (Göttingen: Vandenhoeck & Ruprecht, 1982), published in English either as *The Book of Concord* or *The Confessions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church*, depending on the edition.

III. Curriculum Outline

1. The curriculum is, as indicated, based on six age groupings: Grades or years 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, with an approximate age range of 5 to 12 years.
2. For each grade, the Sunday school material comprises 30 lessons divided into three 10 lesson terms covering the periods Autumn, Winter, and Spring.
3. The first lesson of each grade/year begins with the topic of baptism and seeks annually to communicate to each child the centrality of baptism for Lutheran faith and theology. As Luther once wrote, "Whoever has crawled out of the water of baptism can boast, that he (she) has been consecrated a priest, bishop, and pope, although not everyone is suited to exercise such an office" (WA 6: 408, 11-13).
4. The subsequent lessons are based on biblical stories and are supplemented with catechetical material, drawn chiefly from the *Lord's Prayer* (Grades 1 and 4), the *Ten Commandments* (Grades 2 and 5), and the *Apostles' Creed* (Grades 3 and 6). As indicated above, each lesson is accompanied by a memory verse and, where possible, by a craft.
5. Repetition of lesson material for the grades 1 and 4, 2 and 5, and 3 and 6 is intentional to reinforce learning. Memory verses, however, are not repeated and will be assigned per individual grade/year with the intention of expanding each child's mastery of biblical material.
6. The format is flexible to allow deviation from the curriculum to prepare for Christmas and Easter children's services and for "Ask the Pastor" lessons as negotiated between the teachers and the pastor.

IV. Curriculum Explanation by Section

1. Curriculum Logo

The curriculum logo incorporates Luther's Rose and the words "Truth - Christ - Freedom - Being Lutheran."



A. About his rose, Luther wrote,

The first thing expressed in my seal is a cross, black, within the heart, to put me in mind that faith in Christ crucified saves us. "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness."

Now, although the cross is black, mortified, and intended to cause pain, yet it does not change the colour of the heart, does not destroy nature- i.e., does not kill, but keeps alive. "For the just shall live by faith," -by faith in the Saviour.

But this heart is fixed upon the centre of a white rose, to show that faith causes joy, consolation and peace. The rose is white, not red, because white is the ideal colour of all angels and blessed spirits.

This rose, moreover, is fixed in a sky-coloured background, to denote that such joy of faith in the spirit is but an earnest beginning of heavenly joy to come, as anticipated and held by hope, though not yet revealed.

And around this ground base is a golden ring, to signify that such bliss in heaven is endless, and more precious than all joys and treasures, since gold is the best and most precious metal. Christ, our dear Lord, He will give grace unto eternal life.

B. About the words "Truth - Christ - Freedom - Being Lutheran":

In the course of 1517-1518, the young monk *Martin Luder* began to change the spelling of his name to *Martin Luther* to reflect the Greek word *eleutheros* meaning "free." John 8:32 says that "the truth will make you free." When *Martin Luder* learned of the truth of the gospel of Jesus Christ, that sinners are made right with God by faith alone, he was set *free* (*eleutheros*) to live for Christ alone. Thus, "Being Lutheran" is first and foremost being like Luther, being set free from the powers of sin, death, and evil to live by faith alone in the truth of the gospel and in those truths congruent with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Taken together, the curriculum's logo is meant to signify that Christian freedom in Christ is at the heart of the Lutheran faith and witness to the liberating power of Christ's gospel.

2. Teacher Preparation

The curriculum is designed to save teachers much time and energy trying to navigate and understand complicated lessons. All that is required of teachers is to read each lesson's story in *The Beginner's Bible*, to read the same story in greater context and depth in their own Bibles, and to use the discussion questions and suggestions to guide them through each lesson. That is it.

3. Memory Verses

The memory verses seek to reiterate the lesson of the day by quoting Bible verses from the story itself or from passages with a related message. These verses can be copied and pasted from the curriculum to paper or card or other media as creatively as teachers desire. Teachers know their pupils best. So, teachers are encouraged to help children learn as creatively as teachers are able. Please, have fun creating ways for children to learn their memory verses.

4. Craft / Activity (optional)

Different settings and different teacher abilities and aptitudes will determine whether each lesson is or is not accompanied by a craft or activity. A craft or activity allows teachers the opportunity to use their creative abilities to help reinforce the message of each lesson. Teachers are encouraged to use their own resources or supplemental books or the Internet to find and develop crafts and activities for each lesson. For example, one could copy and paste the memory verse to a sheet of paper and asked the children to draw a fitting picture. Alternatively, one might use words from the story or memory verse to make a word search or crossword puzzle with an online resource. Also, one might recall an activity from one's own Sunday school and introduce it to a new generation. If one does not consider oneself to be very creative, try team teaching with someone who is and let her or him assume responsibility for this portion of each lesson. If in doubt, one might simply ask the children what activities they might like to do. Again, please be creative and have fun.

5. Catechetical Material

The catechetical material, namely the *Lord's Prayer*, the *Ten Commandments*, and the *Apostle's Creed*, are respectively stressed in grades 1 and 4, 2 and 5, and 3 and 6. The Autumn term allows the children to explore the catechetical material for themselves. The Winter term introduces them to Luther's explanations of the material mainly from his *Small Catechism*. The Spring term then gives the children the opportunity to relate the catechetical material to the Bible stories. Where fitting, portions of Luther's *Large Catechism* are also incorporated into the lessons.

6. Each Grade's/Year's Cover Page and this Overview/Introduction

- A. For ease of use, it is suggested that each grade's/year's lessons are printed and placed in a ringed binder or other suitable folder. Each grade/year of the curriculum begins with a cover page which can be placed in the binder or slotted into the front cover of so designed binders. This allows for easy identification of various grade levels.
- B. Teachers are expected to read the information in this Overview and Introduction. Those responsible for parish education in any given congregation are encouraged to guide their teachers through the Overview and Introduction to orient them to the curriculum's goals, objectives, and logistics. Such orientation also allows time for sharing of ideas and teaching strategies.

7. Cost of the Curriculum

The Genuinely Lutheran Learning Sunday School Curriculum is offered free of charge. At great cost to himself, Jesus Christ gave himself to us for our salvation. In that spirit, please offer this material richly and freely to the children in your care. The entire curriculum is available online at St. Luke's Lutheran Church's website (address below) under "Curricula" on the "Academy" page. Each teacher should also be supplied with the curriculum in electronic (CD or DVD) and print formats. Please feel free to copy and paste any portion of the curriculum on to other media (paper, card, disk, etc) as needed for teaching purposes. Autumn



Lesson One - Baptism

(Teacher Preparation - read Luke chapter 3 and or Matthew chapter 3 or Mark chapter 1)

Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children which of them has been baptized and what they think baptism is and means.

A. Read Matthew 3:1-17 See also *The Children's Illustrated Bible*, "John Baptizes Jesus" pages 202-203

Discussion Questions:

1. What was John the Baptizer telling people to do?
2. Whom did John say was coming soon?
3. What can you easily do to be like John?
4. What happened when Jesus was baptized and what did God say about Jesus?
5. What happened when each of you were baptized?

B. Memory Verse

The Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased" (Luke 3:22 - NRSV)

C. Catechetical Material - *The Sacrament of Holy Baptism*

Discussion Questions:

1. What is baptism?

Answer: Baptism is not simple water alone, but it is water grasped in God's command and bound with his Word.

What then is this Word of God?

Answer: In Matthew 28:19, "Go into all the world, teach all nations, and baptize them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

2. What does baptism give or what use is it?

Answer: It effects forgiveness of sins, redeems from death and the devil, and gives eternal blessedness to all who believe as the Word and promise of God announce.

What are the Word and promise of God?

Answer: In Mark 16:16, our Lord Christ said, "Whoever believes and is baptized is blessed; but whoever does not believe is condemned."

3. How can water do such things:

Answer: Water certainly does not do it but the Word of God, which is with and about the water, and faith, which trusts this Word of God in the water. For without God's Word it is plain water and not baptism, but with God's Word it is baptism. That is a water of life, rich in grace, and a "bath of new birth in the Holy Spirit," as St. Paul says to Titus in 3:5-8: Through the bath of rebirth and renewal of the Holy Spirit, which he has poured out upon us richly in Jesus Christ, our saviour, so that we by this grace may be justified and become heirs with hope of eternal life. This is certainly true.

4. What then does such baptism with water mean?

Answer: It means that the old Adam in us shall be drown through daily contrition and repentance and die with all sins and evil desires, and again a new human being shall daily come forth and rise who lives eternally in righteousness and purity before God.

Where is this written?

Answer: St. Paul in the sixth chapter [6:4] to the Romans says, "We are all buried with Christ in death through baptism so that as Christ is raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too shall walk in a new life."

C. Craft / Activity (optional) or D. Baptismal Promise

If you were baptized as a baby or as a child, your parents (guardian) and other loved ones made promises to God that you would be raised to become a Christian. Now that you are older, you can also make those same promises yourself.

The teacher should recite:

"In Christian love, you were was brought to church to be baptized with water and the

Holy Spirit. At baptism, water was placed on you three times in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. At baptism, your parents (guardian) and loved ones promised to bring you to the services of God's house and to teach you the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, and the Apostles Creed.

"Now that you are older, do you also promise to come to the services of God's house and to learn the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, and the Apostles' Creed?"

If so, answer, "I do."

Also at your baptism, your parents (guardian) and loved ones promised to reject sin and to confess the faith of the church.

The teacher should recite:

"Do you renounce the devil and all his works and all his ways? In other words, do you renounce all the forces of evil, the devil, and all his empty promises?"

If so, answer, "I do."

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty,
maker of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

And in Jesus Christ, his only son, our Lord,
who was conceived by the Holy Spirit
born of the Virgin Mary
suffered under Pontius Pilate
crucified, died, and was buried
descended into hell
on the third day he rose from the dead
ascended into heaven
and is seated at the right hand of God, the Father almighty,
whence he shall come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit
the holy Christian church
the communion of saints
the forgiveness of sins
the resurrection of the body

and the life everlasting. Amen.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*

Our Father who art in heaven.
Hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses,
 as we forgive those who trespass against us
And lead us not into temptation.
But deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory,
 forever and ever. Amen.

Lesson Two - Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand / Jesus Walks on Water

(Teacher Preparation - Read Matthew chapter 14, Mark chapter 6, and Luke chapter 9)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how many people they might invite to a picnic and swimming party. Ask the children what sort of food they might eat. Ask the children if they prefer to swim in a swimming pool, in a lake, or in a river. Ask which of them has ever gone water skiing. Ask them what it is or might be like to be out in a boat when the water was or is very rough. Ask the children what happens if they are too far from shore and cannot swim or cannot swim very well enough to return safely to shore.

A. Read: Matthew 14:13-22

Matthew 14:22-33

Discussion Questions:

1. How did Jesus feed 5,000 people with five loaves and two fish?
2. How could Jesus feed 5,000 people with five loaves and two fish?
3. After eating, why did Jesus' friends (disciples) start across the lake without Jesus?
4. Why did Jesus friends have a hard time getting to the other side of the lake? How did they feel?
5. What did Jesus do to help his friends?
6. What did Peter want to do after Jesus came to the boat?
7. Why was Peter not able to do the same as Jesus did on the water?
8. What happened after Jesus rescued Peter?

B. Memory Verse

"But when he [Peter] noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me!' Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt?'" (Matthew 14:30-31 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

First Article: "I believe in God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth."

1. Ask the children to give a definition of the words “God” and “Father” and “almighty” and “maker of heaven and earth.”
2. Ask the children what it mean to believe.
3. Ask the children to write a definition what they think the first article of the Apostles’ Creed means.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord’s Prayer*

Lesson Three - Jesus Heals the Blind / The Temple Tax

(Teacher Preparation - Read John chapter 9 and Matthew 17)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children to describe their favorite scene or picture or room, etc. Ask them what it might be like to be blind. Ask the children how they might imagine the world if they had been blind from birth. Ask for a volunteer (or more) to be blindfolded and then to find an object in the room (try not to draw attention to the object prior to blindfolding). You may also invite others pupils to call out directions to the blindfolded person. Discuss how it felt following directions and the faith need to try and find the object.

A. Read John 9:1-12

Discussion Questions:

1. How do you think the blind man in the story lived his life?
2. Why do you think that Jesus wanted to help the blind man?
3. What do you think of how Jesus cured the blind man?
4. What did the blind man do after he could see?

Opening Discussion (second story):

-Ask the children what it means to pay taxes. Ask them to list the types of taxes most people have to pay (sales, income, property, estate, duty, licence fees, etc). Ask them why it is important to pay tax. Ask them what happens if people do not pay their taxes. Ask the children to decide whether a fishing licence is a type of tax.

A. Read Matthew 17:22-27

Discussion Questions:

1. For whom did the tax collectors in the story work?
2. What might happen to Jesus and Peter if they did not pay their taxes?
3. How did Peter get the money to pay the tax for Jesus and him?
4. What might you do if you found money in a fish that you caught?

B. Memory Verse

“Jesus said, ‘For judgment I have come into this world, so that the blind will see and those who see will become blind’” (John 9:39 - NIV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

Second Article: *"I believe in Jesus Christ, his only son, our Lord"*

1. Ask the children who Jesus Christ is.
2. Ask them what it means that he is the Son of God.
3. Ask them what it means to have a "lord" and what it means to have Jesus as lord.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*

Lesson Four - The Good Samaritan

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 10)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children what the word “neighbor” means [from the word “nigh” meaning “near”]. Ask the children what a neighbor is. Ask the children who their neighbors are. Ask them who God thinks that their neighbors are.

A. Read Luke 10:25-37 See also *The Children’s Illustrated Bible*, “The Good Samaritan” pages 232-233

Discussion Questions:

1. How do act or react when you meet someone different?
2. How do people act or react when they meet you?
3. Which playmates or siblings or even adults have you helped?
4. Who are the people who have helped you when you were hurt?
5. If you saw a stranger hurt along the road, who do you think is best to help?
[The children should be encouraged to find a responsible adult to assist. This is not for children]

B. Memory Verse

“The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, “Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend” (Luke 10:35 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles’ Creed*

Second Article: “*He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried,...*”

1. Ask the children what they think that it means to be “conceived” by the Holy Spirit.
2. Ask the children who the virgin Mary was.
3. Ask them who Pontius Pilate was.
4. Ask them how we know that Jesus was crucified, died, and was buried.
5. Ask them what these four things tell us about the nature of Jesus’ life.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord’s Prayer*

Lesson Five - Mary and Martha

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 10)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children what they are asked to do to help around the house, i.e. clean their room, help outdoors, wash dishes, fold clothing, etc. Ask the children which things they like to do most or least. Ask them to describe why it is fair or not that they are asked to do what is asked of them. Ask the children who should help them with their tasks or chores.

A. Read Luke 10:38-42

Discussion Questions:

1. Who were the two sisters whom Jesus visited when he was in their town?
2. What did Mary do when Jesus came to visit?
3. What did Martha do when Jesus came to visit?
4. Was it fair or not that Martha seemed to do all the work while Mary sat around?
5. Why did Jesus say that Mary had chosen to do the best thing?

B. Memory Verses

“Jesus answered him, “Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them” (John 14:23 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

Second Article: *“He descended into hell,
“On the third day he rose again,
“He ascended into heaven,”*

1. Ask the children what they think that it means to “descend into hell.”
2. Ask the children why they think that Jesus went to hell.
3. Ask the children what they think that it means when the “third day” was. [Easter]
4. Ask the children when Jesus “ascended into heaven.” [Ascension Day]
5. Ask the children how Jesus could do all these things.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*

Lesson Six - The Lost Sheep

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 15)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children what kinds of things that they have lost and could not immediately find. Ask them what difference it makes whether they lose something important or something unimportant. Ask them if they have ever had a pet and what they liked best about the pet. Ask them if the pet ever went missing or died and how they felt about that.

A. Read Matthew 18:10-14; Luke 15:3-7

Discussion Questions:

1. How do you think it is to be a shepherd?
2. What kinds of things does a good shepherd do?
3. How does a good shepherd act if one of the sheep goes astray and gets lost?
4. What might happen to a sheep if it gets separated from the flock?
5. Why does Jesus sometimes talk about human beings as being like sheep?
6. Why does it make God happy when we return to him after straying?
7. How are Matthew's and Luke's version similar or different?

B. Memory Verse

"Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance" (Luke 15:7 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

Third Article: "I believe in the Holy Spirit, ..."

1. Ask the children who they think that the Holy Spirit is. [HS is how God makes relationships].
2. Ask them what name describes the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. [Trinity]
3. Ask the children how the Holy Spirit relates to God the Father and God the Son.
[through creative love]
4. Ask the children how the Holy Spirit relates to human beings. [witnessing to the truth through the Word of God]

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*

Lesson Seven - The Prodigal Son

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 15)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how their parents (guardian) express worry or concern that they not wander off and get separated from their parents (guardian). Ask the children what they would like to do or where they would like to travel when they are ready to leave home. Ask the children what kind of adventures they might like to have. Ask them what their parents (guardian) hope that they will do. How might their parents (guardian) be willing to help them when they leave home?

A. Read Luke 15:11-32

See also *The Children's Illustrated Bible*, "The Prodigal Son" pages 240-241

Discussion Questions:

1. Why did one of the two sons in the story want to leave home?
2. How did the one son spend his time and money once he left home?
3. How did the son live when he ran out of money?
4. How did the son feel about returning home to his father?
5. How was the son received by his father when he returned home?
6. How do you think God reacts when a sinner returns to a life with God?

B. Memory Verse

"Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance" (Luke 15:7 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

Third Article: [I believe in] *"the holy Christian [catholic] church,*
 "the communion of saints,
 "the forgiveness of sins, ..."

1. Ask the children why Martin Luther, the Lutheran Reformer, translated the word for "catholic" as "Christian" in his version of the creed.

[so not to confuse the Roman church with Christianity]

2. Ask the children what "saints" are? [anyone who believes in Jesus Christ]
3. Ask the children what they think that "forgiveness of sins" means.

[turning away from false believe and trusting in Jesus Christ as God declaring us

- “right” or “forgiven our sins”.]
4. Ask them what these three phrases have in common.
[the “church” is the fellowship of believers in Jesus Christ who trust their sins are forgiven for Christ’s sake through his life, death, and resurrection]

Lesson Eight - Jesus Heals Ten Lepers

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 17)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how they feel when they are ill. Ask them how they might feel if they had an illness that could not be cured. Ask them how they might feel if because of their illness people did not want to touch them or even be near them. Ask them how they might feel if they were not well and forced to be with other sick people or alone until they died.

A. Read Luke 17:11-19

Discussion Questions:

1. Have you heard of leprosy?
[It is a bacterial disease that affects the skin and nerves, causing mutilations and deformities. Until antibiotics there was no cure, and even today it is not always easily treated.]
2. Why did the ten lepers call to Jesus when he was passing near them?
3. What did Jesus tell the lepers to do?
4. What happened to the lepers on their way to see the priest?
5. How many lepers returned to thank Jesus for being cured?
6. How often do you thank God for all the good things that you receive from God?

B. Memory Verse

"Then one of the lepers, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving him thanks" (Luke 17:16 - RSV amended).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

Third Article: [I believe in] *"the resurrection of the body,
"and the life everlasting. Amen."*

1. Ask the children what the resurrection is and who was first resurrected.
2. Ask them why they think that the text talks about the "resurrection of the body."
3. Ask them what they imagine "life everlasting" to mean.
4. Ask them who they think will be resurrected and have life everlasting.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*

Lesson Nine - Jesus Loves the Children

(Teacher Preparation - Read Matthew chapter 19, Mark chapter 10, and Luke chapter 18)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how they feel if they are going to see a favorite friend or relative. Ask them why they look forward to Christmas and Easter. Ask them what they might expect if Jesus were coming to visit them or if they were going to visit Jesus. Ask them what they would want to do with Jesus. Ask them how they might feel if they went to see Jesus and then were turned away by someone whom they did not know.

A. Read Matthew 19:13-15; Mark 10:13-16; Luke 18:15-17

Discussion Questions:

"Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it" (Luke 18:17 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Infant Baptism*

1. Ask the children what they understand baptism to be.
2. Ask them why we baptize infants.
3. Ask them why they think that baptism of infants, who may not believe, is still a valid baptism.
4. Discuss the following from Martin Luther's *Large Catechism*.

"We say further that it does not primarily concern us whether the one being baptized believes or does not believe; for baptism does not thereby become invalid, but rather everything depends upon God's Word and command. That is certainly a finer point but rests upon what I have said that baptism is nothing other than

water and God's word about and with one another. That is, when the Word is about the water, so is baptism valid, even if faith is not added; for faith does not make baptism, but it receives baptism. Now baptism does not thereby become invalid whether it is rightly received or used because it is, as said, not bound to our faith but to the Word" (*The Large Catechism*, 4:52-53).

Lesson Ten - Zacchaeus

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 19)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how they would feel if someone were serving something to eat or giving out treats and gave one person more than the rest. Ask the children what they like best and least about sharing what they have. Ask the children why they like to get more of something than others receive. Ask them how they feel if they receive less than others.

A. Read Luke 19:1-10 See also *The Children's Illustrated Bible*, "Zacchaeus the Tax Collector" page 245

Discussion Questions:

1. How did Zacchaeus get his money?
2. Why did people not like Zacchaeus?
3. Why did Zacchaeus have a hard time seeing Jesus?
4. What did Zacchaeus do to see Jesus?
5. What did Jesus do when he saw Zacchaeus?
6. How did meeting Jesus change Zacchaeus' life?

B. Memory Verse

"Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, 'Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much.'" Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham" (Luke 19:8-9 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *The Lord's Supper*

1. Ask the children what they understand the Lord's Supper to be.
2. Ask them why Jesus went to Zacchaeus' house and ate with other sinners and outcasts?
3. How and where does Jesus share a meal with sinners today?
4. Ask them why Jesus gave us the Lord's Supper and what makes it valid and proper?
5. Discuss the following from Martin Luther's *Large Catechism*.

What is the sacrament of the altar?

Answer: It is the true body and blood of the Lord Christ, in and under the bread and wine through Christ's Word, commanded to us to eat and drink. ... For it is

not founded on human holiness but on God's Word. Just as no saint on earth, nor even an angel in heaven, can make the bread and wine into Christ's body and blood, so too can no one either alter or change this, even if it is misused. For neither the person nor one's lack of faith can falsify the Word through which it is instituted and becomes a sacrament. For he [Jesus] does not say, "When you believe or are worthy, then you have my body and blood." Instead, "Take, eat, and drink. This is my body and blood." Likewise, he says, "Do this" (namely, what I now do, institute, give to you, and tell you to take). This is as much as saying, "God gives whether you are unworthy or worthy. So here you have his body and blood by the power of this Word which has come to the bread and the wine. ... It is, then, given as a daily 'pasture and feed' so that faith is refreshed and strengthened in order that it should not retreat in the battle but rather become ever stronger and stronger" (*The Large Catechism* 5: 8, 16-19, 24).

(Teacher Preparation - Read John chapter 11)

Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how many brothers or sisters they might have. Ask the children what happens if they or if their siblings becomes ill. Ask about how someone might have cared for them when they were ill. Ask if the children how they might feel if one of their siblings became ill and had to go to hospital. Ask the children how they might feel if someone they knew was seriously ill and God seemed to do nothing to help.

A. Read John 11:1-44 See also *The Children's Illustrated Bible*, "Mary, Martha, and Lazarus" pages 236-237

Discussion Questions:

1. Why did Jesus decide to go and visit Mary and Martha?
2. How long did Jesus stay where he was before going?
3. How might Martha have been feeling when she met Jesus on his way?
4. What did Martha think would have happened if Jesus had come earlier?
5. How did Jesus raise Lazarus from the dead?
6. What happened when the people saw Lazarus alive again?

B. Memory Verse

"And when he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!'" (John 11:43 - NRSV)

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

What does this mean? **

Lesson Twelve - The Perfume Gift for Jesus

(Teacher Preparation - Read John chapter 12)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children why people use perfume. Ask the children why perfume might have been important in times when people did not bathe as regularly as most people do today in the USA. Ask the children where on the body people use perfume. Ask the children what sort of “perfume” men wear [aftershave or cologne].

A. Read John 12:1-8

Discussion Questions:

1. Why do you think that Martha and Mary had a dinner party for Jesus and his friends?
2. What did Mary do for Jesus that was a bit unusual?
3. Why might Mary have thought that this might have been nice to do to Jesus’ feet?
4. Why did Judas complain that the perfume should have been sold?
5. What might you do for Jesus as a gift to him?

4. Ask the children how Jesus' death brings us closer to him even though his is not present in a way that would allow one to apply perfume to his feet.

Lesson Thirteen - Make Way for the King

(Teacher Preparation - Read Matthew chapter 21, Mark chapter 11, Luke chapter 19, and John chapter 12)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children what sort of parades they have seen. Ask the children what sort of people they might see in a parade. Ask the children what they like best and like least about watching parades and, where applicable, about being in a parade. Ask the children what sort of a parade they might have for Jesus to show that he was special.

A. Read Matthew 21:1-11 See also *The Children's Illustrated Bible*, "Jesus Enters Jerusalem" pages 256-257

Discussion Questions:

1. What did Jesus ask two of his friends to fetch for him near a village gate?
2. What sort of a saddle did Jesus have when he rode the donkey?
3. What were the people shouting as Jesus approached Jerusalem?
4. What does "Hosanna" mean? ["Hosanna" means "help" or "save".]
5. What did people lay on the road as Jesus rode into Jerusalem?

Lesson Fourteen - The Widow's Coins

(Teacher Preparation - Read Mark chapter 12 or Luke chapter 21)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children why it is important to give money to the church. Ask them what other projects need money to serve people both in the USA and abroad our church supports. Ask them why some people give more and some people give less money to the church. Ask them how God judges who gives the most to serve God's ministries.

A. Read Mark 12:41-44 and Luke 21:1-4

Discussion Questions:

1. Why did people put money in the money boxes in the temple?
2. Why did Jesus think that the woman who put two coins into the money box gave more to the temple than those who put much money into the money boxes?
3. How are the stories in Mark and Luke similar or different?

Lesson Fifteen - Jesus Washes the Disciples' Feet

(Teacher Preparation - Read John chapter 13)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children what they like most and least about helping their parents (guardian) or teacher or other adult in their lives. Ask the children what they like most and least about helping one of their siblings or friends. Ask the children what they would not want to do to help someone else. Ask the children what would and would not want to do to help Jesus.

A. Read John 13:3-30 See also *The Children's Illustrated Bible*, "Preparing for the Passover" pages 262-263

Discussion Questions:

1. How did many people, including Jesus' church leaders, feel about Jesus?
2. Who were some of the disciples who were still friends with Jesus?
3. Why do you think that it was unusual for Jesus to wash the feet of his disciples?
4. Why do you think that Peter did not want Jesus to wash his feet?
5. Why did Jesus say about his wanting to wash the feet of his disciples?

Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children what the word “betray” means to them. Ask the children how it felt if they told someone a secret only to have the other person tell their secret to someone else. Ask the children how it felt if someone promised to do something for them and then that person did not fulfil the promise. Ask the children how someone might betray God.

A. Read Matthew 26:17-29 See also *The Children’s Illustrated Bible*, “The Last Supper” pages 264-265

Discussion Questions:

1. What plan did Judas make so that he could get more money?
2. How much money did the church’s leaders of Jesus’ day pay Judas?
3. How did Jesus know that one of his disciples would do something bad to him?
4. How did Jesus show who was going to betray him?
5. Why did Jesus share a cup of wine and some bread with his remaining disciples?
6. What did Jesus promise his disciples?

B. Memory Verse

3. Ask the children what God wants to give us that is more important than our bodily needs.

(Teacher Preparation - Read John chapters 18 and 19)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children what it is like to be left alone. Ask the children how they might have felt when shopping or elsewhere, and they could not find their parent (guardian) or anyone else whom they knew. Ask the children what it is like when their friends or schoolmates do not want to play with them.

A. Read Matthew 26:14-16, 36-57, 62-68; 27:32-50, 57-61

Answer: I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to him, but the Holy Spirit as called me through the gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, and kept and sanctified me in the right faith, just as calls, gathers, enlightens, sanctifies, and keeps the whole of Christianity in the one, right faith. In this Christianity, he daily and richly forgives me and all believers of our sins, and on the last day he will raise me and all the dead, and he will give me along with all believers in Christ eternal life. This is certainly true.

1. Ask the children why it is hard for human beings to believe that God loves us so much that he would allow Jesus to die on the cross.
2. Ask the children why we teach in baptism that we are united with Christ in a death like his and that we will be united with him in a resurrection like his (see Romans 6:1-11).
3. Ask the children how Christians should live their lives knowing that God promises to forgive all their sins, to raise them from the dead, and to give them eternal life.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*

Lesson Nineteen - Jesus' Surprise Visits

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 24)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children if they have ever tried to disguise themselves or to hide from someone. Ask the children if they have met someone whom they thought that they knew but did not. Alternatively, ask the children if they have forgotten that they have met someone before.

A. Read Luke 24:13-35 See also *The Children's Illustrated Bible*, "On the Road to Emmaus" pages 280-281

Discussion Questions:

1. What were two of Jesus' disciples discussing on their way to the town of Emmaus?
2. Why did his disciples not recognize Jesus when he approached them?
3. How would you describe Jesus' last days in Jerusalem to someone else?
4. How did Jesus show his disciples that he had risen from the dead and was really alive?
5. How did Jesus reveal the Bible prophecies about himself to his disciples?

B. Memory Verse

Jesus said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be preached in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem." (Luke 24:46-47 - RSV).

Ask the children to think of ways in which one can use these two words, such as going up stairs, how an airplane takes off and lands, how a hot-air balloon behaves, etc. Ask the children which word one might use to describe how Jesus got to heaven. Ask them where Jesus also descended.

[So that they might believe in Jesus and live with him forever.]

[Greek word for the Jewish Feast of Weeks (harvest festival) celebrated 50 days (Pentecost meaning 50) after the second day of the Passover on which the ceremony of the barley sheaf was observed when the first fruits of the harvest were offered to God (Leviticus 23:15-17).]
3. What happened to Jesus’ disciples when they gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate Pentecost?
4. What could Jesus’ disciples do after they had received the gift of the Holy Spirit?
5. How is the story of Pentecost a remedy of the story of the Tower of Babel (see *Children’s Bible*, pages 36-40).
6. Why did many people come to believe in Jesus because of the Holy Spirit’s work on Pentecost and in the first churches?

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *The Lord's Prayer*

On a sheet of paper divided into three columns, ask the children to write the text of Matthew 6:5-15 in the first column and the text of Luke chapter 11:1-4 in the third column. In the center column, have the children write the Lord's Prayer. Then, have the children draw lines from the biblical texts to the corresponding petitions of the Lord's Prayer. Ask them for their observations.

Ask the children who brought the Ten Commandments from God to God's people. Ask the children where the people of God were before they received the Ten Commandments. Ask them why God gave them the Ten Commandments.

A. Read Regular Bible Story - Exodus 20:1-20

Discussion Questions:

1. What would happen to people if they had other gods from the one, true God?
2. What does God show to those who keep his commandments?
3. What is the Sabbath?
4. Why were the people afraid as Moses received the Ten Commandments?

B. Memory Verse

"I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. "You shall have no other gods before me" (Exodus 20:2-3).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Ten Commandments*

From Exodus 20:1-20, have the children formulate the Ten Commandments as closely as they can to the version used in the catechism.

3. *Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.*
4. *Honor your father and your mother.*

(Teacher Preparation - Read Acts chapters 4, 10, and 13)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how the Christian faith is passed from one person to another. Ask the children who has taught them about God the Father, Jesus his Son, and the Holy Spirit. Ask the children what makes the life of Jesus different from the lives of all other people. Ask the children what aspects of Jesus' life they would think most important to communicate to others.

A. Read Regular Bible Story - Act 10:34-48

Discussion Questions:

1. What kind of a speech did Peter give in this Bible passage?
2. What aspects of Jesus life did Peter tell to the people?
3. Why was Peter preaching to the people?
4. What is the relationship between what Peter was saying and where the Holy Spirit fell?
5. What did Peter command happen to the people who believed in God because Peter told them about Jesus?

B. Memory Verse

"While Peter was still speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word" (Acts 10:44 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Apostles' Creed*

The following biblical passages correspond to elements in the three articles of the Apostles' Creed. Divide a sheet of paper into two columns. In one column, have the children write out the Apostles' Creed. In the other column, have the children look up the verses and then list the verses in the second column opposite the article of the creed to which the verses correspond. Please, mix the verses and make them available on a board or sheet of paper. See if the children can ascertain which element of the creed is not found in the Bible.

(Teacher Preparation - Read Luke chapter 3, Acts chapter 10, and Romans chapter 6)



Opening Prayer (by teacher)

Opening Discussion:

-Ask the children how old they were when they were baptized. Ask the children what it means to be baptized. Ask the children how they would tell their friends why baptism is important.

A. Read Regular Bible Story - Romans chapter 6

Discussion Questions:

1. How are those who are baptized united with Jesus Christ?
2. After baptism, how should we consider ourselves in relation to God and to sin?
3. From what does baptism set us free?
4. What are the wages of sin?
5. What is the free gift from God?

B. Memory Verse

“Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life” (Romans 6:4 - NRSV).

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material - *Holy Baptism*

Luther On Baptism

“For to be baptized in God’s name is not to be baptized by human beings but by God. Therefore, although it happens through human hands, it is nonetheless truly God’s own work. From this each one can well conclude that it is a much greater work than that done by human beings or saints” (*The Large Catechism*, 4:10).

“Thus you can clearly see that this is no work done by us but a treasure which he gives and faith grasps, just as the Lord Christ on the cross is not a work but a treasure held in the word and presented to us and received through faith” (*The Large Catechism*, 4:37).

“Therefore, regarding baptism, each Christian has enough to learn and to practice

for a lifetime; for one always has enough to do to believe firmly what it [baptism] promises and brings: victory over the devil and death, forgiveness of sins, God's grace, the whole Christ and the Holy Spirit with his gifts" (*The Large Catechism*, 4:41).

"Now in baptism, everyone is brought to the door for free to receive such a treasure and medicine which swallows death and keeps every human being alive. Therefore, one must look well on baptism and make use of it so that it will strengthen and comfort us when our sin or conscience weighs down on us. Despite that, we say, "I am baptized, and if baptized, then I have the promise that I shall be blessed and have eternal life, both in soul and body" (*The Large Catechism*, 4:43).

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*

Lesson Thirty - Telling Your Favorite Bible Story



(Teacher Preparation - Review the Table of Contents for Grades One through Three to gain an overview of the stories that have been covered. This will allow you to help the children find their favorite Bible story either in the *Beginner's Bible*, in the curriculum, or in the Bible.)

Opening Prayer (by teacher)

A. Read Ask the children to read their favorite Bible story.

Discussion Questions:

1. Why is this your favorite Bible story?
2. What do you like best about this story?
3. What is God telling you about himself in this story?
4. How would you tell this story to your family and friends?

B. Memory Verse

Ask the children to find and write out their favorite memory verse.

C. Craft / Activity (optional)

D. Catechetical Material

Ask the children who can recite the Ten Commandments or the Lord's Prayer or the Apostles' Creed. Ask if anyone is able to recite all three. Ask them to say why the Ten Commandments and the Lord's Prayer and the Apostles' Creed are important for their lives as Christians.

E. Closing Prayer - *The Lord's Prayer*
