Sin Boldly? or Sin Boldly!

Martin Luther is known for making interesting and sometimes seemingly outrageous statements. Luther did so because he sought to help people break out of their narrow view of God and of God's salvation offered to all humanity. Many of us have likely heard that Luther advised people to "sin boldly." That definitely sounds outrageous, especially coming from a great Reformer of the church. The command to "sin boldly," however, is only half of the phrase. For those who have heard this first part, do you recall what the subsequent portion is? Before moving onto that second part, let us stop at the already quoted bit.

"Sin boldly!" What sinner among us does not like to hear words like that? On one hand, we all know that sinning is bad and that sinful deeds arise from us sinners having broken relationship with God. Every Sunday we confess the gravity of our sin by saying that "we are in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves" and that "we are by nature sinful and unclean" deserving God's "present and eternal punishment." On the other hand, encouragement to "sin boldly" seems too good to be true. It sounds like permission to go out and flout all Ten Commandments in one go. So, let's have a little contest. Whoever can break all Ten Commandment the quickest wins the prize. That sounds like a great party game or a really raucous ice breaker in the church new members class. Imagine the newly found affection which teenage catechism pupils would have for Luther. We

can almost see the headlines now. "Entire Church Youth Group Arrested for ...!" (acting like their parents, probably).

Whereas many of us can remember the challenge to "sin boldly," the knowledge of a continuation to that phrase might leave us feeling a little uneasy. We often see, hear, know, or experience what happens when we or others "sin boldly." It fills the pages of the newspapers and energizes the internet. Sinning boldly comes with all manner of warning labels on all manner of consumer goods, whether aimed at adults or not. Currently, California legislators want to ban "red dye" as "harmful" because it might lead people, God forbid, to die of dye. So, the hope to cast the dye into oblivion. Meanwhile, those same Californian legislators have legalized all manner of much more harmful and lethal substances, practices, and procedures than the "red dye die" could ever pose. Perhaps such legislators are really keen Luther scholars. The legalizing of very harmful and lethal substances, practices, and procedures does sound much more like "sin boldly" than does eating a few Skittles® or the like.

The idea of sin and sinning carries with it an explicit or implicit judgment of right and wrong. Sin is wrong, and not sinning is right, or at least not wrong. When Adam and Eve were tempted by the serpent to ignore God in order to know the difference between good and evil, they were led to believe that bad was good, and good was bad. So, they sinned boldly, and the rest of humanity has, only because of God's continual graciousness, been a mitigated disaster ever since.

So, what was Luther actually saying? In a letter to his sidekick, Philip Melanchthon, on oi August 1521, Luther wrote,

If you are a preacher of grace, then preach a true and not a fictitious grace; if grace is true, you must bear a true and not a fictitious sin. God does not save people who are only fictitious sinners. Be a sinner and sin boldly, but believe and rejoice in Christ even more boldly, for he is victorious over sin, death, and the world. As long as we are here [in this world] we have to sin. This life is not the dwelling place of righteousness, but, as Peter says, we look for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells. It is enough that by the riches of God's glory we have come to know the Lamb that takes away the sin of the world. No sin will separate us from the Lamb, even though we commit fornication and murder a thousand times a day. Do you think that the purchase price that was paid for the redemption of our sins by so great a Lamb is too small? Pray boldly—you too are a mighty sinner" (LW 48:281-282).

Rather than admitting our mighty sins in light of the all-mighty graciousness of Almighty God, in our sin, fear, and unbelief, we seek instead to minimize our sins by minimizing God. Taken to its logical conclusion, if God does not exist, then *voilà*, we are no longer sinners, at least in relation to a non-existent God. Instead, however, we become not only sinners but also

at times criminals in relato politicians who want to play god and tell us what is right and what is wrong, regardless of what God in scripture has said.

Every October, we Lutherans celebrate Reformation Day (31 October), or at the very least Reformation Sunday towards the end of October. In Luther's day, in the name of God the papacy had dispensed with God and created an intricate and elaborate labyrinth of ways for sinful human beings to work out their salvation apart from Christ. In this system, the church was right, and God was wrong. In our day, while despising the name of God, atheists have banished God from society and offer instead new vistas of secular salvation both apart from and contrary to Christ.

In our milieu, "sinning boldly" is praised, and believing, even timidly, is ridiculed. Over against the godlessness and ungodliness of the secularized world around us, let us in their eyes "sin boldly" by believing and rejoicing "in Christ even more boldly" because nothing in all creation can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Joyous Reformation celebrations to you all!

Mighty Fortress, Rock of refuge, bless all civil authorities, especially our president; Congress; and all who make, administer and judge our laws. Protect them from the temptations that beset their offices, and grant them wisdom and courage to serve with integrity. Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.

Mighty Fortress, Rock of refuge, be near to all who cry to You for healing of body and soul [especially ______]. Grant them release from their afflictions according to Your will. Sustain their hope in the full and final healing that awaits them at the day of Christ's appearing. Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.

Mighty Fortress, Rock of refuge, we give You thanks for all Your servants who have departed this life in faith. We especially bless You today for the great reformers of Your Church who call us back to the Gospel and to the righteousness we have in Christ alone. Keep us in fellowship with them, and bring us at last to our heavenly home to see our Redeemer face to face; through the same Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.


