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Thanksgiving and Advent

November for US Americans finishes with the celebration of Thanksgiving. This year, Thanksgiving will be observed on 23 November. Celebrating harvest thanksgiving festivals obviously predates the US version featuring the Pilgrims, turkeys, pumpkin pies, department store parades, and football games. Little did the original pilgrims know that their thanksgiving would become the kick-off for the Christmas shopping season.

Almost immediately after Thanksgiving is observed, the new church year begins with Advent, which itself marks the beginning of the church liturgical year. That is why the altar guild schedule also begins in December 2023 and not in January 2024. Like Thanksgiving, however, Advent is often overshadowed by Christmas. Why might this be?

As the name entails, Thanksgiving means giving thanks. Even though people tend to feast until bursting, at Thanksgiving we don't really "get" anything like at Christmas. The same applies to Advent. Apart from getting the occasional Advent calendar, which nowadays seems to include not only chocolate, beer, or wine but also pet treats, Advent too does not leave us expecting to "get" anything. Christmas, however, is much different. From the earliest of ages, children are trained to expect to "get" presents, perhaps lots of presents, not only from Father Christmas but from all manner of relatives, etc. In comparison, Thanksgiving and Advent have nothing to "offer," so to speak.

Despite the expectation of an abundance of gifts, Christmas often comes with a catch. Whereas one expects presents to be free, in popular lore at Christmas they are not. To receive one's Christmas gifts one needs to be good! You know the old jingle, "You better watch out. You better not cry. You better not pout", Why? Because if you do, Santa will not be very generous at all. In fact, if one is naughty, the proverbial stick and piece of coal will fill one's stocking. Whereas such possibilities might have encouraged children to have behaved in the past, that is probably not the case today. Even today's atheists would probably consider withholding Christmas gifts as some form of child abuse.

The theologically interesting aspect of such Christmas expectations is their quid pro quo nature. One needs to be good in order to receive. Whereas this expectation hopes to get people to behave and whereas this expectation makes the receiving of gifts a reward, it also represents an understanding of "Christianity" which is just as pagan as so many other Christmas observances and traditions. The pagan element is that we have to do something to garner favor with god or the gods because if you do not, you had better watch out!

So, even if Christmas promises to be more lucrative than Thanksgiving and Advent, and obviously in many ways it is, such rewards are not gifts, which actually makes their existence contrary to Christmas itself. Whereas we traditionally think of Christmas as the celebration of Christ's incarnation, Christmas is actually a chief celebration of justification, which takes place as a gift; that is, by grace alone though faith alone.

So, what good are Thanksgiving and Advent. Contrary to conventional thought and chronology, Thanksgiving and Advent become important after Christmas. In other words, if it were not for Christmas and the gift of God's son to sinful humanity celebrated at that time, there would be no reason for Advent. Likewise, there also would be no reason at all to give thanks to the one, true God because we would still be lost in our sin, separated from that God forever.

So, as the holiday season approaches, let us prepare not to celebrate Thanksgiving as an isolated American holiday but rather as our daily disposition towards the God whose advent we celebrate not only in advance of Christmas but every time we gather to celebrate his arrival when he presents himself to us whenever and wherever his gospel is purely proclaimed and his sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper are rightly administered. - Pastor Mark


