How Important is God's Word to You?

We often think that God's word is ancillary to our lives, an add-on which we can take or leave as our mood or needs suit us. Some of the members of the church in Corinth had similar thoughts. Below is another excerpt from Luther's commentary on I Corinthians 15 which specifically raises this topic. In relation to verse 34, Luther writes,

"Wake up fully, and sin no more. For some have no knowledge of God. I say this to your shame" (I Corinthians 15:34 - Luther's translation)

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"St. Paul adds these words in order to exhort and warn them [the Corinthian congregation] the more strongly against evil talk, showing them how to comport themselves, lest they be misled. He wishes to say: 'See to it that such babblers do not find you drowsy or sleepy or weary and indolent. For so you are already giving way to them, and the door is open to all babblers and seducers. I have often said, and I still say, that this is a most pernicious vice, which is called satiety, or, as it has been called to date but not understood or explained correctly, slothfulness toward worship. In it one is bored with the sermon and says: 'Oh, I know this myself; I have often heard it; if I care to, I can read it at home. Why should I constantly listen to the selfsame thing?' They go their way, assuming that they possess the treasure in rich measure, so that they cannot want for it. But St. Paul declares the reverse here: 'Beware and be on your guard lest you become too secure and imagine that you know it too well; for you will surely be deceived.' For even if a person is on his guard, it will

be difficult to prevent evil talk from entering secretly and before one is aware of it.

"Therefore it is always necessary to live vigilantly and circumspectly and cautiously, so that we are not taken unawares and work our own harm. Otherwise we might share the fate of those who suddenly and unexpectedly go to the devil. Take an example from an insane man whom I have seen. Whenever he opened his mouth, he would invariably say: 'Thousand devils!' also when he stumbled or bumped against some object. His neighbor often warned him to drop those words. He might, the neighbor said, fall perilously and fatally some time, and then the fellow whom he named would come after him. But he ignored this and said: 'Oh, if it really comes to that, I myself know very well that I must shun those words.' However, not long after this it happened that he crossed a bridge, and before he knew it, he stumbled and fell into the water. And immediately he uttered the customary words: 'Well, in the name of a thousand devils!' The devil appeared at once, broke his neck and fetched him as he had desired. 50 These smug spirits may fare the same way. They regard themselves so learned and so safe that they need not hear this or read it or think that the devil comes creeping along stealthily with evil talk and suggestions, making them lose Christ and His Word. And now the devil sways them as he will.

"I myself often experienced and discovered that the devil can cunningly lead a person away from the Word. Whenever he notices that I am armed and that I am occupying myself with God's Word, he leaves me in peace. However, when I give him even as little leeway as not to think of it and to occupy myself with other matters, he comes after me and quickly gives me a blow, which makes my position difficult until I can again lay hold of the Word. What would happen if I, too, were so smug and deemed myself so learned and refrained from preaching or hearing and reading the Word for half a year or a quarter of a year, since I have enough to do

as it is to defend myself with daily study and prayer?

"Therefore, if you want to avoid being misled, St. Paul says, and losing what you have, you must be watchful and not snore. You must cultivate the Word so that you can maintain your position and defend yourself against this evil pest to keep it from gaining a foothold among you. It does not lie within your power to prevent evil talk from arising and to prevent hearing the world; but it behooves you to be vigilant and not to give way to it but to ward it off wherever it raises its head. For the devil will surely not slumber or snore but will assail you. too, on all sides, wherever you may be. Therefore you must also be on your guard against this, armed with God's Word wherever you are, at home or abroad, in church, in your chamber, at table, and wherever you associate with people. Thus God also commanded His people to write and inscribe His commandments everywhere before their eyes so that they could always behold them and thereby resist all kinds of temptation and offense (Deut. 6:6 ff.).

"Such diligent occupation and concern with God's Word St. Paul expresses with the words 'wake up' or 'be vigilant.' He does not speak merely of waking up but of waking up fully, or of being so wide-awake that it can really and blessedly be called that, that is, according to God's Word. The world, too, is vigilant with regard to its affairs, but not with regard to God's Word. But it is true vigilance to be awake in God's Word, with it to repeal and defeat the devil and his poisonous darts. Therefore this does not mean to watch as a city watchman does, to prevent someone from breaking in or working harm; or as master or mistress watches in a home to assure that the servants arise early in the morning and perform their tasks. That is a part of municipal and domestic administration, to see to it that everybody attends to his duties and that all proceeds properly. But here, St. Paul says, we must watch so as not to sin. The world must watch against poverty, against disturbance of the peace, or against enemies, so that all may

be well with people and country. But our watching serves to end sin and to prosper and preserve righteousness; it serves the reign of faith and of love and the extermination of unbelief. This demands that we earnestly occupy ourselves with and cultivate God's Word always and everywhere, snatch it up avidly, hear it, sing it, speak and read it gladly against the despicable satiety and indolence of which I have spoken. Then we will have our castle and fortress well guarded and all holes closed to keep the devil from stealing in. Otherwise, if I or others fail to preach with diligence and if you do not hear it or are practiced in it, imagining that you are well acquainted with it—that is not watching or warding off but slumbering, letting your head droop, indeed, it is snoring right in the midst of the devil's guns and spears and affording him a good and safe place for breaking in and ascending into the castle without difficulty" (LW 28:164-167).

Vacation Bible School (VBS) 2025 is quickly approaching and is scheduled for July 21-25 from 5:00 pm to 8:00 pm. This year's theme is "Restored in Christ." The Bible teaches that we are restored in Christ through baptism. Do you remember your baptism? What is baptism anyway? VBS 2025 will be awash with dinner, singing, lessons, games, and crafts.
