### Back to School?

In the "old days" long before school districts had such varied academic years and vacation breaks, going back to school generally took place after Labor Day. Correspondingly, the "back to school" sales would fall in August. Nowadays, to accommodate the various return to school dates, "back to school" sales probably need to start in July, if not in June!

Likewise, as the starting dates seem all over the place, so do the ending dates. Viewed differently, perhaps it is actually the case that all schools have become year-round activities broken up by varying lengths of vacation. In other words, school today never seems to end! Unfortunately, that may make school a form of purgatory.

Another aspect of school is finishing altogether, usually either by graduating or by dropping out. Either way, there is often a great sense of relief being done with something tedious if not extremely laborious. The "work" aspect of school these days, however, seems to be "problematic," and so no efforts are spared to make school work fun, interesting, exciting, etc. That same trend is also visible in churches' efforts to offer vacation Bible school (VBS). When I was a child, we had to learn VBS memory verses not with songs and games but rather with stone tablets, hammers, and chisels! Maybe that is why my theological studies got off to a rocky start.

Unfortunately, in the church the hope of being done with school or learning frequently takes place well before high school graduation. The break with church learning, which is not Christmas, spring, or ski break, often happens when completing catechism/confirmation. Now, it is highly likely

that after spending two years of learning with me our confirmands may never want to see a church again. That said, this phenomenon of "dropping out of church" pervades most if not all Lutheran churches, and as many of us know, it is nothing new.

For many of us who have not "graduated church" after confirmation, unfortunately the learning slows or stops altogether. So, ask yourself, do you know all Ten Commandments? What benefits does baptism give? Who receives the Lord's Supper worthily? Perhaps more importantly, who's on first? (Oops, wrong line of questioning.) So, how well did you do with those three questions on the mini catechism self -administered test?

If many or most of us are not terribly conversant with Luther's Small Catechism, how well are we doing with the Bible? For example, is the Book of Hezekiah in the Old or New Testament? Likewise, in which Testament is the Book of Hebrews? On that topic, what is a Testament, and how does one know whether it is truly older or newer and why?

For many or most of us, our understanding of and disposition towards "school" and "learning" in the church has been coloured negatively by our experiences with secular schools. As important as schooling is for one's future endeavours, there is a certain amount of drudgery which unfortunately also affects our disposition toward continued learning but especially at church. So, is there a difference between school and church learning, and if so, is it important?

At what age did you start school? How old were you when you finished high school? Do you remember when you finished learning a trade or graduating from college? If you have further or advanced trainings and degrees, why did you undertake those? With such learning experiences under your belt, how long will their cumulative effects benefit you? In other words, how long do you expect to live?

Our learning in the church has a much greater scope than secular school learning. Of the many things which we do learn in church, we often recognize that many of these are extremely useful for our everyday lives. If we listen to and follow the guidance, directives, and rules of the Bible, we will inevitably be "better" persons, children, parents, spouses, citizens, employers, employees, etc. Yet, we all know non-believers who do well and even excel in all those roles and capacities. To the dismay of some, scripture cannot be considered a handbook for material, financial, familial, or societal good fortune and well-being. Even with these scriptural benefits, our church learning concludes when we graduate from our earthly life.

Fortunately, the most important learning which we undertake in church does not stop with the undertaker. In church through scripture, preaching, and teaching, song, and prayer we learn how God created everything. We learn how humanity fell into its relentless state of sinfulness. When even God's guidance, directives, and rules failed to offer eternal hope, God sent his Son, Jesus, to mediate a new life for us with God, his Father, through Christ's life, death, and resurrection. Despite his ascension to the "right hand of God," Christ is nonetheless intimately intertwined with every aspect of our lives. He is present in his word. He makes us part of his body in baptism, daily drowning the old sinner in us and raising up a new, little Christ. Then, he continually makes himself present in his own body and blood reminding us of the forgiveness of our sin whenever we celebrate the Lord's Supper.

Contrary to worldly thinking, our learning in the church is not designed to help us in either temporal or eternal advancement. Our learning is designed to equip us to share the gift of salvation with fellow sinners both competently and confidently. There are many opportunities for learning at St. Luke's which entail varying degrees of time and depth. The children and adults just finished a week of VBS. Children's Sunday school will resume mid-September.

Catechism also resumes mid-September. The adult Sunday school class has taken only a one month break in August this year. The WSL Bible study, to which all are invited, meets two Wednesday mornings each month. Finally, St. Luke's Theological Academy (STLA) is offering four 10 (ten) week courses which also start mid-September. That is a lot of learning opportunities for church learning!

You are invited to come "back to school" this autumn to continue to become ever more competent and confident sharing the gift of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Of the above listed opportunities and courses of learning, which will you choose?
